15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

St. Michael's College, Cherthala is affiliated to the University of Kerala and strictly abides by the curricula set by the University. The college has embraced an interdisciplinary approach to cater to the technological and scientific advancements of society. The college provides opportunities to promote new modes of learning. Online and offline learning are integrated to be more productive and to procure global standards. Theoretical and practical knowledge imparted in Add-on Courses and Certificate Courses increases employability. Whereas Value Education classes complement the academic curriculum and contribute to the holistic development of the students focusing on their personal growth, social awareness, and eco-consciousness. In the fifth semester of the undergraduate programme, students can choose a paper from other departments. MoUs enable students to get exposure and hands-on training in new arenas utilizing the expertise and resources of the institutions. Research grants from DST FIST and KSCSTE are utilized for addressing the pressing needs of society. Research works are promoted to bring out positive change and create a more equitable and sustainable society. The extension activities performed by NSS, NCC, Clubs, and Women Cell kindle the inner potential of students and foster a sense of social commitment. Community College offering vocational courses accommodate the diverse needs of the students and provide an inclusive supportive learning environment. IGNOU Study Center operates as a platform for academic support, peer interaction, and collaboration.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The college is affiliated with the University of Kerala and follows

a Choice Based Credit System for all the programmes. Students have the option to select certain courses from the curriculum. Each course is assigned with specific grade points and weightage. At the end of each semester, an SGPA is awarded based on the performance in the respective semester and SGPA is carried forward to the subsequent semesters. At the end of the final semester, CGPA is awarded for overall performance. The provision for multiple entry and exit would be implemented as per the directions of the university. University of Kerala provides additional credits for students in NCC, NSS, sports, and arts. The students in NSS and NCC get weightage for higher education and job opportunities. Add-on Courses and Certificate Courses developed by the faculty incorporate reading lists, practical sessions, expert sessions, assessment tests, and assignments. To transfer the subject matter expertise and pedagogical skills, the institution encourages the faculty members to create content on MOOC platform. The students are motivated to enroll in courses offered by SWAYAM and Coursera.

17.Skill development:

The institute focuses on improving the soft skills and vocational capacity of students. Since 2014, the college has two vocational courses to its credit. B.Voc Software Development and B.Voc Tourism courses are a part of the National Skill Qualification Framework. BBA Logistics equips the pupils with the principles and practices of business management. The various departments of the college provide certificate courses like Food Science and Quality Control, Basic Corporate Accountant to nurture knowledge and life skills. To impart constitutional, ethical, and ecological values and to enable students to take the right choices in life, the college conducts a value education programme. Internships, field visits, field projects, study tours, on-site training, and nature camps enhance knowledge, practical skills and perspectives in various fields. UG and PG Courses have compulsory projects in the final semester. Entrepreneurship Development Club, Science Club, Book Club, IT Club, Commune, NSS, NCC, Women Cell, Career Guidance and Placement Cell initiate seminars, workshops, training programmes, expert sessions, Covid Relief Projects, SPARSAM 2021, Vimukthi discussion forums. Jwala, Youth Innovator's Programme, OPPAM 2021, Youth Skill Programme, Awareness Day on Violence Against Senior Citizens, AADHARAV 2021, Tree Plantation Drive, Clean Campus Drive are some of the initiatives undertaken by the various organisations. Michael's Community College offers vocational courses.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

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A bilingual mode of teaching is adopted for easy understanding of the subjects thereby developing a sense of pride and belonging among students from diverse linguistic and cultural backgrounds. Pupils have the option to learn Malayalam or Hindi during the first year and second year of their undergraduate degree course. In arts festivals, competitions on Indian art forms like Oppana, folk song, folk dance, etc are organised to understand the richness of traditional arts, literature, and culture. The final year BA English students are encouraged to conduct research on various Indian art forms like Kadakali, Theyyam, Chavittunadakam etc. The institution commemorates special days like Kerala Piravi, Hindi Divas, Mother Tongue Day, Yoga Day, National Technology Day, National Reading Day, National Music Day, Independence Day, Teacher's Day, Gandhi Jayanti, and Constitution Day. Social extension activities help the students to connect with the communities and become beneficiaries of ancient traditional knowledge. Department of History is actively conducting programmes to inculcate a sense of pride in diverse Indian culture and Indian history.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The curricula set by the University of Kerala have specific outcome-based objectives for every course. To enhance competency-level learning, the university designs pedagogy and assessment practices. Teachers discuss the outcomes of each programme with the students in the teaching-learning process. Results, enrolment in higher education courses, and placements resound the success of outcome-based education.

20.Distance education/online education:

The institution envisages providing blended learning, a versatile educational approach accommodating diverse learning needs. Making use of digital spaces and technology, teachers conduct classes in platforms like Moodle, Google Classroom, and other digital interfaces like Zoom, Google Meet, and YouTube. Assignments, quizzes, and tests are convened via online platforms. Prerecorded classes are also made available. The efficacy of the class is evaluated by the feedback collected. The library offers digital facilities for pupils to access e-learning resources like INFLIBNET and NList. The students are allotted INFLIBNET passwords at the beginning of the first-year class. Proper guidance classes are given to access the vast array of scholarly content across the globe at any time.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Being affiliated to the University of Kerala, the college follows the curriculum, prescribed by the respective Board of Studies under the University. Our faculty members on the Boards of studies, do contribute to the curriculum development. The college follows the academic calendar, issued by the University and follows it strictly. The college prepares a college level calendar, in tune with the academic calendar of the University. A department level time table will be prepared by the respective departments and a general time table will be generated.

The Principle along with the CBCSS Team, addresses the freshers during the Induction Programme in which the team orients the students about facilities, code of conduct and discipline, add-on courses and extra-curricular activities.

The staff council is held periodically by the Principal to review and discuss on the curriculum delivery. The Department level monitoring committee maintains a syllabus tracker for the periodic review of the coverage of portions.

Seminars and webinars are arranged by the IQAC to give exposure to the current trends in different areas of knowledge. Some departments maintain department library with issue register

The CBCSS coordinator, in adherence to the academic calendar of the university, prepares the schedule of continuous Internal evaluation well-in advance and implements the same on time. Test papers, MCQ on Google Form, Seminars and Assignments are conducted as per the schedule, issued at the beginning of the academic year.

The class PTA is usually convened after the publication of results and personal mentoring is given to the needy students. The Entry Level Assessment test and a meticulous analysis of the results of the qualifying examination, enable the teachers in having an estimate of the academic calibre of every fresh batch, according to which they might be able to develop and modify teaching methodology. Mentoring sessions proved to be crucial at this juncture, where the tutors get to know the background, whereabouts and aptitude of students. The sensitization of the teaching process towards the holistic development of students has positively culminated in the imagineering of effective learner-centred methods to ensure the maximum level of student satisfaction and better performance. The department-wise and discipline-wise/multidisciplinary programmes for teaching and learning are carried out, ensuring an absolute cent percent student participation and progress. The very concepts of experiential learning and participatory learning that entail learning activities viz. industrial visits, study tours, association/club activities, conduction and participation of academic contests prove to be decisive in transcending the grim confines of rote-learning and narrow, exam-oriented efforts. The technological boom that has made its sweeping take over on all walks of life has marked its repercussions in the teaching-learning fields too. The delivery of courses is made to undergo timely modifications that suit the technological advancements trending within the domain of information and technology. However, the brighter side of this was viscerally experienced during the Covid phase wherein the entire education system would have come to an impasse without the ICT tools. Significantly, year 2021 marks the crucial coming back to the offline mode of campus life. Though classes were brought back from the virtual space provided by Google Meet and G-Classroom to the real classroom, the online platforms have been retained for the faster circulation of updates, distribution of notes and even as part of mentoring. MOODLE and SWAYAM platforms are depended and suggested, with the simultaneous attempts at course designing and compilation of syllabi. In addition, students are rightly oriented towards the effective utilization of E-Resources, especially E-Books, Journals and platforms like JStor and INFLIBNET. The College library is moving steady and fast towards fully automated status yet students do make optimal use of the available facilities like E-Catalogue, Book status update system and archiving.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

Admiring and adhering to the concept of transparency as the cornerstone for the regular formative assessment process, the institution has launched and successfully running the College Level Monitoring Committee for the conduction and publication of results of centralized internal-cum-model exams that uncompromisingly follows the University exam model and timing. This drastic procedure positively bestows the students with the maximum exposure needed as preparatory for facing the University Exams, free of stress and inadequate preparation. The question papers are duly set by the concerned faculty in the prescribed uniform format for which templates are shared via email, with the necessary guidelines as well as the final date. The CLMC, with the support of the office staff, also coordinates and supervises the allotment of exam halls, seat numbering, preparation/circulation of the duty chart, attendance board and bundling. The system mandates the time-bound valuation of answer scripts and the publication of marks on or before the deadline. Alongside, those students who fail to attend exams due to genuine reasons are given a second chance in the form of scheduled retests. The proper functioning of the system is closely monitored and feedback collected for timely reforms and improvisation.

The management is committed to creating a safe, supportive, and inclusive learning environment. Every student is given an equal opportunity to participate in different activities of the college. CCTV cameras are installed in different parts of the campus to ensure safety and security. Grievance Redressal Cell, Equal Opportunity Center, Internal Complaints Committee for Women, Committee for Prevention of Caste Discrimination, Human Rights Committee, and Women Cell actively participate in ensuring gender equity, creating awareness about gender issues, safeguarding gender rights, and promoting respectful behaviour towards all. Mike Kid Zone, the daycare and preschool situated on the premises is aimed at providing a safe environment for the kids of St. Michael's fraternity. Training programmes on personality development, stress management, self-defense, rallies on gender equity, gender awareness workshops, and discussion forums are conducted by Women Cell to understand gender issues, gender stereotypes, and gender equality. Value education classes offer awareness about discrimination and foster an inclusive environment. Legal awareness and policymaking classes are conducted regularly to raise voices against gender-based violence, and inequality. The only national-level shooting range in the Alappuzha district is situated on the premises of the college, the students can take training in arms. Medical camps, Anemia Awareness Programmes, and classes on health and wellness are organized consistently addressing special health needs faced by different genders. Women's Day and National Girl's Child Day are celebrated to inspire students especially young girls to dream and achieve great heights. The college has facilities and arrangements to dispose of the waste in an eco-friendly way. Bins are installed in various spots on the campus to collect segregated wastes. The organic waste generated on the campus is collected in the vermicomposting unit of the Department of Zoology. The nutrient-rich compost is used to fertilize the plants. Solid wastes are taken up by the Harithakarma Sena of the local body. Students and staff are encouraged to reduce waste by using eco-friendly materials. The use of steel bottles, steel lunch boxes, cloth bags, paper pens, paper files, and cloth banners is promoted. The incinerator is used for disposing of sanitary pads. Single-use plastic is banned in college. NSS volunteers are given training for utilizing recyclable materials. Minimum and optimum use of chemicals are encouraged in laboratories. Reuse and purification of chemicals are done wherever possible. Electronic waste like motherboards, hard drives, and cables are reused to fix faulty systems and used in the workshop of the Department of Software Development. Besides, the rest of the e-waste is collected by Harithakarma Sena for proper disposal. The quantity of hazardous waste produced is limited by reducing the number of such experiments in the lab.

7.2 - Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

BEEP(B.Voc Education Extension Programme) is a community-focused initiative aimed at establishing a relationship with the community, gaining insight into their challenges, developing an intervention strategy, and effectively addressing the issues. As a part of the programme, the computer software proficiency level of students of Cherthala South High School, Ariparambu was accessed, and provided classes to improve their skills. Besides, a bookshelf stocked with books was donated to the school library. A health awareness class was organised at Little Flower School, Mathilakam to promote a healthier lifestyle among primary school children. Cleaning drives

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were conducted at Alappuzha Beach Park and Mararikulam Beach. To promote waste management practices, bins were installed in different spots on the Mararikulam beach.

Educate the School Children is a programme prioritizing the enhancement of the teaching-learning process, especially in science subjects where the resources are limited. Chemwonders is a programme initiated by the Department of Chemistry offered opportunities for hands-on training in experimental procedures for learners in schools. Exhibitions were conducted for high school students. Quiz competitions, painting competitions, and debate competitions were held for school students. Workshop was organised for high school teachers to sharpen their skill set. Science laboratories were set up in high schools.

The Performance of St. Michael's College, Cherthala to address Post-COVID Trauma (2021-2022)

During the academic year 2021-2022, St. Michael's College, Cherthala placed a strong emphasis on addressing post-COVID trauma among its students and promoting their overall development. The college implemented several initiatives to achieve these goals. Recognizing the mental and emotional impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on students, the College took the initiative to conduct awareness classes addressing post-COVID trauma, focussing the students at the college as well as neighbouring schools. To tackle the excessive use of mobile phones and redirect students' focus towards academics, the college organized IT security training sessions to raise awareness about the potential risks associated with excessive mobile phone usage. The Women's cell took initiative to organize training programs to help students handle post-COVID stress effectively, focussing on equipping students with strategies to manage anxiety, stress, and other mental health issues arising from the pandemic. Additionally, personality development sessions, self-defence

training workshops and gender sensitization classes were conducted. Health awareness sessions, beach cleaning at Alappuzha and Mararikulam, computer literacy classes and bookshelf donation to neighbouring schools were some initiatives taken up under the B. Voc Education Extension Programme (BEEP).
