Major Extension activities carried out by NSS

My Tree Challenge:

As part of the World Environment Day, St. Michael's College NSS Unit initiated a new campaign named "My Tree Challenge" aimed at making the world greener by planting more trees. The initiative was inaugurated by the Principal of the college, Dr. V. Mathew, with the distribution of one thousand saplings to the students. Each student was entrusted with a challenge that he/she must plant it and share the picture through NSS Facebook page by tagging a friend who, in turn, plant one and challenge another. Thus this network was expected to bring a collective effort in social forestry initiatives of the NSS. Actually 632 students including 200 NSS volunteers actively participated and 2528 saplings were planted through the 'My Tree Campus Challenge'.

Green Audit and Energy Conservation Efforts

Our NSS unit joined the international green efforts by creating an Energy Club for volunteers. The club started functioning last year. The primary focus of the wing was not only on energy and climate change, but also included topics such as campus waste, food, and water usage; all of which have an impact on climate change. Practical and innovative sustainability efforts and methods are underway on campus ranging from small individual steps to collective social step.

This year, as part of the green audit, the volunteers visited the houses in the adopted village and recorded the monthly household usage of electricity and the total electronic and electrical equipment in each household. They induced the people to reduce power consumption by giving the exact picture of their power consumption analysis. They have also given suggestions for proper use of electricity. For this, KSEB gave assistance to the volunteers. In the next month, these volunteers visited the adopted village once again and recorded the usage of power consumption. It was evident that the average use of electricity was reduced considerably. They conducted energy quiz in each household and distributed LED lamps to the winners.

A cycle rally was organised in association with KSEB, Cherthala Division on 4th March 2017 at part of the Energy Conservation Day from Aroor to S. L. Puram. Smt. Maya, Assistant Executive Engineer, KSEB, flagged off the rally.

Plastic Waste Management:

Plastic rejections are considered to be the major contributor towards the irreparable damage caused to the environment due to pollution, world over. Inordinate dumping of plastic near water bodies and indiscriminate burning of plastics are the root cause of exponential increase in the pollution index of many cities in India. In an effort to alleviate the hazards posed by indiscriminate disposal of plastics in the streets and open dump yards in the adopted village and water bodies, our NSS units commenced the collection of low grade plastics from rural areas. The NSS initiated implementation of green protocol during this festival season in all the temples and churches of Cherthala South Panchayath.

The NSS volunteers conducted a mega cleaning drive at Arthunkal beach after the end of Arthunkal Basilica Feast on 28th January 2017. The volunteers collected one hundred kilograms of plastic waste from the shore. The plastic was handed over to Mathrubhumi Seed Club for recycling. The volunteers also conducted one week cleaning drive in the adopted village.

Rain Water Harvest Tanks:

Our NSS units constructed 5 rainwater harvesting (RWH) tanks made of ferro-cement in the past one year that will approximately collect about four crore litres of rainwater in this year. The RWH project is the joint venture of Cochin Shipyard, ADS Alappuzha and St. Michael's college NSS unit. In this project, volunteers built tanks with the capacity ranging from 1000 to 5000 liters across the coastal areas of Cherthala.

Blood Donation Camps:

During 2016-17, St. Michael's College NSS unit organised 5 blood donation camps both in and outside the campus.

- ➤ The first camp was on14.06.16 as part of World Blood Donor. World Blood Donor Day celebration brings a precious opportunity to all donors for observing it as to commemorate the birthday anniversary of the Karl Landsteiner. The camp was held at Bishop Peter Chenaparambil Hall, St. Michael's College, Cherthala. 154 volunteers were registered for blood donation and only 129 could donate because of medical parameters.
- The second camp was on 26.10.16 as part of Gandhi Jayanthi Celebrations. The camp was organised by NSS at Thannermukkam Yuva Deepthi Hall in association with District Medical College, Kottayam. Along with selected volunteers, 173 youngsters donated blood.
- The third camp was on 02.11.16 as part of the birth anniversary celebration of Kerala State. The camp was held in the Botany Lab of the college. The HDFC Bank provided refreshments for the volunteers on the occasion. More than 100 students registered and 81 of them have donated blood.
- The fourth Camp was on 01.12.16 as part of World Aids Day. The camp was organised at Thaluk Hospital Blood Bank, Cherthala. The members of all youth clubs of adopted village and few selected volunteers offered blood on the day. Total 41 units of blood donated through the camp.
- The fifth camp was on 13.02.2017 as part of the state convention of cable operators association, Alappuzha. The NSS unit organised the camp at Mankomp, Alappuzha. The District Medical College, Alappuzha received the blood units of 114 donors including NSS volunteers.

Kidney Disease Detection Camps:

A simple blood test can accurately detect kidney disease and life style diseases. In an endeavor to raise health awareness and to highlight the importance of regular health check-ups, the National Service Scheme Unit of St. Michael's College regularly conducts Free Blood Tests and Health Check-up Camps as part of its 'HAWA' (Health for All, Wealth for All) project. A series of health camp were organised by the NSS in association with Muthoot M George Foundation in Cherthala, Thannermukkam, Kanjikkuzhi and Mararikkulum during 2016-17. In this health care outreach program, with a mobile van for detection of kidney related diseases, diabetes and hyper tension ailments were identified through blood checkups. The camp started at 6 am in the morning. At the end of the camp there was an awareness session which provides information about the prevention and treatment of the disease. From June 2016 to March 2017, total 28 such camps were organised under the leadership of Sri. Pratheesh. P, the NSS Programme Officer.

Ayurveda Medical Camps:

Ayurvedic medicine aims to integrate and balance the body, mind, and spirit. This balance is believed to lead to happiness and health, and to help prevent illness. The second 'HAWA' initiative of the year was specialized Ayurveda medical camps. The camps were conducted in association with District Medical Office (Indian System of Medicine), Kottakkal Aryavaidyasala, S D Pharmasy and Dhanwanthari Ayur Pharma.

The first camp was on 23rd July 2016 at Reethalayam. There were 154 patients registered in the camp and 139 visited the camp. A team of specialized doctors from District Medical Office attended the patients. Free medicines worth Rs. 25000 were supplied by S D Pharmacy and Dhanwanthary Ayur Pharma.

The second camp was on 21st February 2017 at Areeparambu. This camp was sponsored by Kottakkal Aryavaidyasala. A team of specialized doctors from Kottakkal Aryaivaidyasala attended the camp. The ayurveda cancer care and treatment was the specialization of the camp. Free medicines worth Rs. 30000 were distributed through the camp.

Ophthalmology Camps:

The St. Michael's College NSS unit conducts periodic rural cataract camps for the underprivileged. Three of such camps were conducted during 2016-17 in association with Little Flower Eye Research Super Specialty Hospital, Angamaly and Sacred Heart Hospital, Cherthala. The first camp was on 13th July 2016 at Ottamassery with Little Flower Hospital. The second camp was on 10th December 2016 at Ayyappanchery with Sacred Heart Hospital. The third camp was supported by Little Flower Hospital on 7th February 2017 at Mannanchery. The patients screened at the camps are transported to the base hospital, operated, housed and transported back to their villages free of cost.

Homoeopathy Medical Camps:

For those who opt homoeopathy treatment, our NSS unit organised two free mega medical camp and awareness programme for the adopted village in association with AYUSH and Scheduled Castes Department in January and February 2017. The first camp was on 24th January 2017 at Areeparamb. Smt. V. A Sethulekshmy, President, Cherthala South Panchayath inaugurated the camp. The second camp was on 26th February 2017 at Pollethai.

Gynaecology and Urology Camp (Health with a Smile):

The Health with Smile is a programme under 'HAWA' which is initiated by NSS and Kinder Women's Hospital, Cherthala. Health care remains beyond the reach of the poor populace, added with lack of health seeking behaviour. And for the women folks in poor rural outreach, health care need is never sought for, besides being beyond their affordability.

The first camp was organised at Padanilam on 31st July, 2016. Dr. V. Mathew, Principal, St. Michael's College, inaugurated the camp with a participation of more than 130 people.

Around 80 women patients from Sarvodaya village and the neighbouring villages were given free gynecology consultation and medicines at a special camp on 10th November 2016 at Mayithara under 'Health with a Smile' scheme. Sri. Isac Madavana, Cherthala Muncipal Chairman, inaugurated the camp.

A third 'Health with a Smile' camp was conducted at Thaikal on 19th February, 2017. Sri. A. M. Arif, Member of Kerala Legislative Assembly, inaugurated the camp. There was 143 participants in this camp.

The fourth 'Smile' camp was at Pallippuram on 19th March 2016 with 124 participants. Sri. P. Pratheesh, NSS Programme Officer, inaugurated the camp. There was a health education class for women thereafter.

As part of Women's Day celebrations, a treatment scheme under 'Health with a Smile' was started. Through this scheme, free treatment worth rupees twenty five lakh was reserved for patients from NSS adopted village. This scheme is planned to continue till March 7th, 2018.

'Hridayapurvam', a complete heart care camp:

Under 'HAWA', the NSS unit organised a mega cardiology camp on the campus in association with Dr. K. M. Cheriyan Foundation and Parumala St. Grigorious Cardio-Vascular Centre on 7th October, 2016. Free lab test worth rupees 15000 were arranged for each patient. Pediatric Cardiology cell was the

attraction of the camp. Dr. V. Mathew, Principal of the college, inaugurated the camp. Eco test, Tread Mill Test, ECG and other cardio-lab tests were offered in the camp with free of cost.

Multi Specialty Mega Medical Camp:

A multi specialty mega medical camp was organised under 'HAWA' on 2nd July 2016 at St. Francis Assisi Higher Secondary School, Arthunkal with Amrutha Medical College, Ernakulam. Around 2000 people from Cherthala South Panchayath attended the camp. Ophthalmology, Dental, Ortho, Pediatrics, Dermatology, Gynecology, Cardiology, Nephrology, General Surgery and General Medicine were the special clinics in the camp. The patients were attended by specialist doctors from Amrutha Medical College and distributed free medicines. Those who were screened for surgery were issued with concession rate cards for future treatments. The camp was inaugurated by Smt. V. A. Sethulekshmi, President, Cherthala South Panchayath.

Free Dental Camp:

In association with Indian Dental Association, the NSS unit organised a free dental camp on 12th March, 2017 at Mararikkulum. Sri. J. Umeshkumar, Circle Inspector, Mararikkulum, inaugurated the camp.

Animal Welfare Camp:

The National Service Scheme Units of St. Michael's College, Cherthala organised an Animal Welfare camp at Government Higher Secondary School, Cherthala South to treat the animals and also to guide the livestock farmers regarding scientific rearing of animals. Sri. K. C. Venugopal, Member of Parliament from Alappuzha Constituency, inaugurated the camp on Saturday. About 100 farmers of the area participated in the event.

On this occasion, Dr. Sugunan, Veterinary Medical Officer of Cherthala South, said, 'Veterinary hospital is going to establish one mobile operation unit in the coming year'. It will be a milestone for the improvement of animal farm activities in the area. He also proposed a survey with the help of NSS volunteers of St. Michael's College in Cherthala south Panchayath. On the basis of this survey, future programmes will be formulated, he added. This camp will also work to improve health as well as nutritional status of cattle, buffaloes, sheep, goat etc. Farmers will be made aware about silage and hay, green fodder and better reproductive practices.

Cancer Care Medical Camp:

As part of Cancer Day Observance, the NSS unit organised a cancer care medical camp on 4th February 2017 at Alappuzha. Sr. B. Mehabub, Member of Alappuzha Municipality, inaugurated the camp.

Toilet Project (Open Defecation Control Scheme)

Eliminating Open Defecation in India by 2nd October 2019 – the 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi – is one of the key aims of the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan Movement launched by Prime Minister Narendra Modi. As a part of this national movement, our NSS started toilet construction project last year. In 2015-16, the NSS unit constructed 40 toilets with the assistance of Amrutha Madam, Kollam. In this year, 2 toilets were completed in the adopted village and achieved 'total sanitation village' status by November 2016. Along with ADS, Aleppey 2 more toilets were constructed in the coastal areas of

Cherthala. Thus, NSS contributed 31 toilets and served its part in Awachh Bharat Abhiyan Movement. The total cost of the project is rupees six lakh. The construction of toilets is a major focal area for NSS activities this year.

Creation of Rural Public Libraries and School Library:

Reading can provide spiritual sustenance and is a habit that should be cherished and developed from a young age. Libraries have a recognized social function in making knowledge publicly available to all. They serve as local centers of information and learning, and are local gateways to national and global knowledge. As a result of one month long efforts taken by the volunteers of NSS Unit of St. Michael's College, a rural public library was inaugurated in the adopted village. The village reading room, which was left static during last 35, was adopted by the NSS Unit and started the campaign for donation of books to the library which is finally, achieved success by transforming the reading room into a library with 2000 books. The volunteers call for donations in the form of books raised immense response. The library was inaugurated by Sr. P. Thilothaman, Minister of Food and Civil Supplies, Government of Kerala on 18th December 2016. Rev. Fr. Solomon Charagatt, College Manager, Dr. V. Mathew, Principal and programme officers were present at the occasion.

A second library was opened at 'Hope Village' in the adopted village. This library had 2500 books in which 1000 were donated by the NSS volunteers. Another effort of NSS to extend libraries in the society succeeded when ADS and District panchayath decided to assist in creating school libraries. The programme was inaugurated by Sri. G. Venugopal, President of Alappuzha District Panchayath on 30th March 2017 at Karmasadan, Alappuzha.

A hundred for a Hunger:

Hunger is one of the most serious and obvious manifestations of crisis in the world. Directly or indirectly it leads to many vices prevalent in the society. NSS Unit of St. Michael's College wishes to intervene into curbing such occurrences and do away with hunger by our initiative "A 100 for a Hunger". With the support and encouragement from generous hearts and kindness of humanitarians from all walks of life we wish to build a hunger-free society. The programme got started last year and still continues. The students of the college arranged food by 'skip a meal' and the food thus collected was distributed among the people in the street.

- ➤ The first programme this year was on 7th June 2016 at Devaswam Hall, Cherthala. The volunteers prepared food for 150 people.
- ➤ The second programme was on 15th July 2016 at Padanilam and distributed 90 food kits.
- ➤ The next event was on 22nd August at Kanichukulangara and distributed 100 parcels.
- ➤ On 2nd September 2016, a public meal was organised at Mayithara as part of teacher's day celebrations and the food w sponsored by the teacher community of the college.

Old Age Home Visits:

The complete life, the perfect pattern, includes old age as well as youth and maturity. Old age has its pleasures, which, though different, are not less than the pleasures of youth." This is something that the volunteers realised when they visited the old age home at Mayithara. In collaboration with different functions, our NSS unit was organizing the visit to a senior citizens' home. The inmates were very hospitable and friendly, and they welcome us always with their beautiful smiles.

➤ This year's first visit was on 23rd July to celebrate the University and State NSS Awards received by the unit. Volunteers distributed sweets to the inmates and lunch thereafter.

- ➤ The second visit was on 27th December 2016 as part of community intervention programme in the National Integration Camp. The NSS volunteers from various states interacted with the inmates and performed some cultural talents.
- ➤ This year's third and final visit was on 12th February 2017 to celebrate the birthdays of three NSS volunteers with the senior citizens. The birthday sweets and lunch were distributed. The volunteers also conducted a cleaning drive in the old age home thereafter.

Next major achievement is the Onam Festival Celebration with the patients. On 13th September 2016, the NSS team conducted a one day celebration in the hospital. The volunteers, along with the inmates, prepared a beautiful flower carpet (Athappukalam) infront of the main building. The volunteers offered two 'oonjal'(a special attraction of onam, an oonjal is a swing that is typically anchored to the branch of a tree using coir rope and the bottom is a wooden plank which offer oscillatory movements for the body) ready at the portico and performed it with the inmates. Another crucial element of onam celebration, the 'onakkodi'(new dress), was distributed to all inmates. Thereafter, a splendid 'onasadhya' (special lunch with payasam) was distributed. The cost of the celebration was rupees 15,000 and was realized through conducting paid minor games on the campus as part of campus onam celebration. Onam is celebrated to honour King Mahabali, who according to legend ruled the state once, under whom the people were equal, prosperous and happy. This message was realized through this one day programme.

With the assistance received from District Prison, Ernakulum, our NSS extended 'share a meal' scheme to the hospital. Under this scheme, on 10th December 2016(Human Rights Day), 20th February(Social Justice Day) and 24th March 2017, lunch was provided for the inmates.

The most touching event that was credited to NSS orange line activities this year was the birthday celebration of these poor patients. The NSS Units organised a unique birthday celebration at Prathyasa Leprosy Home on 2nd February 2017. The 41 inmate's birthdays celebrated on this single day as it is the annual day of the Leprosy Home. The volunteers arranged 10 birthday cakes, hundreds of sweets and gifts for their beloved inmates of this hospital. Programme Officer, Pratheesh. P delivered the birthday message. Thereafter, volunteers performed excellent cultural programmes for the birthday party.

Disability Certification Camp: Through 'We Care' programme, our NSS organised disability certification camp for the people of Cherthala, Thannermukkam and Kanjikkuzhi Panchayaths on 10th August 2016 at Community Hall, Kanjikkuzhi. The programme was conducted by Kerala Social Security Mission of the State to ensure that all the disabled in the State enjoyed the rights conferred on them by the UN Convention for Persons with Disabilities and that they received all the benefits reserved for them. We ensured that all the disabled persons in each of these Panchayath were brought to the camp with the help of anganwadi workers and saw that all disabled persons got the ID cards and benefits out of this. Sensitisation camps were held at Panchayath, Block and Anganwadi workers level prior to this main camp. ID Cards, Pass Book and Medical Certificate for all disabled persons were given on spot in the camp.

Donation of Wheel Chair: Through 'We Care', the NSS volunteers of 2016 NSS Special Camp donated wheel chair for Kum. Shini. The chair was handed over by Sri. P. Thilothaman, Minister of Food and Civil Supplies, during the College Golden Jubilee Inauguration function.

'Ona Nidhi': Onam, the state festival of Kerala, was celebrated in September. For the poor and disabled families of adopted village, the NSS volunteers distributed 55 Onam Kits containing all the provisional

items for onam kitchen. Each volunteer contributed one item to the bag. The distribution programme was inaugurated by Dr. V. Mathew, college Principal.
